

ACCESS TO HEALTH SERVICES

Lack of Health Insurance Coverage



In Cass County, 7.6% of adults aged 18 to 64 do not have health insurance. This means they have no private insurance or government coverage (like Medicaid) to help pay for medical care.


What does this mean for Cass County?

- Cass County has a lower uninsured rate than Douglas County, where more people lack coverage. Cass has a similar rate to Sarpy County.
- The number of people who are uninsured in Cass county is also lower than both the Nebraska and US average.

Excessive Drinking




In Cass County, 21.3% of adults engage in excessive drinking, which includes both heavy and binge drinking. This is lower than the Metro Area average, but still higher than the state average for Nebraska and slightly higher than lowa.

- The rate of excessive drinking in the Metro Area has been decreasing since 2018, which is a positive trend.

Presence of Neighborhood Barriers That Prevent Physical Activity




One of the main barriers that Cass County residents face when engaging in physical activity is sidewalks that are missing or in poor condition.

- · This is much higher than the Metro Area average.
- In Cass County, 70.1% of adults are overweight, which is close to the Metro Area average (72.2%). This is higher than the national average (63.3%) and the Nebraska average (70.4%).



Low-Weight Births (Percent of Live Births, 2016-2022)



In Cass County, 7.0% of babies born between 2016 and 2022 had a low birthweight (less than 5 pounds, 8 ounces). Babies born at a low birthweight are more likely to face health problems and even death. Many of these issues can be prevented with good prenatal care.

At the time of the survey, 20% of Metro Area adults reported feeling symptoms of moderate-to-severe anxiety and/or depression. This was based on a Patient Health Questionnaire-4 (PHQ-4) score of 6 or higher.

The PHQ-4 is a short survey that screens for anxiety and depression symptoms. It doesn't diagnose but helps identify those who may need further evaluation. Participants reported how often, in the past two weeks, they felt anxious, worried, depressed, or lost interest in activities.

• These feelings have increased significantly since 2021.

What does this mean for Cass County?

• In Cass County, 12.4% of adults reported experiencing moderate-to-severe anxiety or depression. This is lower than the Metro Area average.



"Often" or "Sometimes" Worry About Food Running Out Before Having Money to Buy More



In Cass County, 22.1% of people reported worrying about running out of food in the past year.

• Cass County's rate is higher than Sarpy County but lower than Douglas County and Pottawattamie County.
